<p>The Data was collected on eleven pre-decided parameters by asking the respondents to multiple choice questions. In these questions the respondents were asked to give choice on a scaling type of questionnaire containing options ranging from 1 to 5. After collection of the data from the respondent this data was compiled statistically analyzed to get an average score for each of the parameters individually where ever required a net score for the concerned staff member. The results were tabulated individuals were informed personally by Head of Institution regarding their strengths and weakness so that the weak areas could be strengthened. In case of administrative or other sectors the complete report was prepared and submitted to the office of the principal for the necessary action. It has been decided that feedback system for next session will be made better on the basis of previous experience and format will be redesigned according to requirements of institution.</p>

Students mentoring system: In order to resolve day to day academic problems of the students, mentors are appointed for a batch of 60 students, and they will counsel the respective students once in month, to solve The problems come across during their course of study. This is a continuous process till the end of academic career of the student. During the last semester of study, students are advised for higher studies along with proper career guidance. Reasonable numbers of students have secured admissions for their higher studies and they in turn guide their juniors for their prospective admissions. 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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous Internal Evaluation at institute level: Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and project work are the internal modes of assessment. The college being affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla adheres to the syllabus prescribed by the University. An academic calendar clearly specifying the date/time of various academic events to take place during the academic session should be notified prior to the commencement of the academic session. Semester examinations are held as per HPU examination schedule at the semester end. The evaluation system, as adopted by the Institute, has two components, viz, 1. The Internal Assessment (IA) 2. The End Semester Examination (ESE) The

ratio of weightage is 20 in CIE and 80 in ESE for UG (for theory) and 30 in CIE and 70 in ESE for PG (for theory). For practical, it is 50 each for both UG and PG. For effective implementation of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level, the institute conducts one test per course per semester and performance based improvement test. The answer scripts are given back to the students after evaluation for their information, providing sufficient transparency and accountability. CIE marks are shown to students along with their answer scripts by the teacher concerned enabling them to have access to the evaluated answer scripts before the marks are forwarded to the examination section. It also promotes the student to participate in mini project demonstration, model exhibition, programming skill competitions, mega projects, technical paper presentation, workshop, and seminar. CIE Components also includes MCQs, Quiz competition, home assignments, Lab Exercises and Practical. The college encourages and guides students to participate in national level competitions organized by other Colleges and Universities. Students are encouraged to get involved in industry sponsored projects as a part of their curriculum in final year. The college gives facility to participate in competitive examinations and higher studies. Industrial visits are arranged for the students and students submit the visit report which is also evaluated for term work marks. For each program viz., UG, PG and Professional courses, suitable components are included in their CIE. The participation and performance of students in sports, NSS, and other extracurricular and cultural activities is also given weightage. The feedback system is provided to the students for giving the feedback on all fronts. The institute communicates progress report of their ward to the parents. It organizes parents and guardians meet to have a communication once in year.

The college formed an academic calendar at the beginning of the session. The calendar was designed as per the schedule of admissions and examinations given by the affiliating university. Physical facilities: The maintenance and utilization of the College physical facilities is carried out by the College Physical Development Committee with the head of the institution (Principal) as the Convenor. For maintenance of a clean campus environment, grade IV staffs are assigned to various jobs and duties - cleaning of classrooms, corridors, faculty room, toilets, office, library, College compound etc are done on regular basis. Skilled workers are hired for repair works relating to buildings, furniture, etc. **Library:** The Library Advisory Committee headed by the Principal is constituted to look into the smooth and efficient functioning of the Library. It also tackles issues relating to library facilities. There is a librarian with supporting staff to help student and teaching faculties in searching and lending books in the library. There are 13582 Textbooks, 1,030 reference books, 80409 ebooks in the library. At the time of admission, students are issued digitized library cards which will be valid till their final semester. Internet facility is provided in the library and students can access the facility for availing eresources and other web based information. Photostat facility is also available in the library. These facilities can be availed on nominal payment with due permission from the librarian. The library is under cctv surveillance. **Sports (indoor and outdoor):** The college has an excellent record in the sports arena. This year our sports persons have performed exceptionally well in the InterCollege and InterUniversity championships. The college celebrated Annual Sports Day on 15th Feb, 2020. More than 200 athletes (men women) participated in 20 different events. Mr. Akshay Kumar and Priya both of B.A. 1st semester were declared best

athletes in their respective categories. The college successfully hosted the HP University Hockey Championship (Men) held w.e.f. 01 to 03 Nov. 2018 in which 18 teams of various colleges participated and our college won the championship.

The College participated in 16 sports events in men's section and seven in women's section in HPU inter College championships. It is a matter of honour that our college scored 15 (highest) points in overall tally of HPU sports activities in men's section and became the overall champion. Special appreciation is due to Sh.
